In it's place there will be a reverse parade held at Southeast Christian Church on Blankenbaker Lane. The reverse parade will have booths with exhibitors. Visitors will drive cars through a lane of exhibitors and participants. The Governor Isaac Shelby Chapter will have a large

location representing the SAR and honoring Veterans with the flags and banners and SAR and DAR members waving to the crowd as they drive by. We hope to have as many SAR and DAR participants as possible for this fun first time event. More information coming.

- November 19<sup>th</sup>, 7 pm, 2020 Chapter Meeting and New Member Pinning. The November meeting is planned to be in-person with a Zoom meeting link. The meeting will include a special ceremony to officially welcome and pin new members into the SAR and Governor Isaac Shelby Chapter. The location is still being determined.
- The Annual Pearl Harbor Day Dinner and Awards Ceremony Canceled. Due to the Coronavirus increase and the need for increased social distancing, the annual Pearl Harbor dinner has been canceled. A virtual memorial ceremony for Pearl Harbor Day will take the place of the event. The dinner has been moved to February.

A virtual ceremony will be held by the Chapter to remember and honor those who served and died at Pearl Harbor hallmarking the entrance of the United States into World War II. - <u>Financial Audit</u>. The annual audit of the Chapters finances and bookkeeping was completed in October by Charlie Scott and Tom Higgins. The outcome showed there were no issues. Treasurer Rod Smothers has done a great job managing the finances.

## **End of Year Activities and Planning.**

Looking for More Member Outreach. One of the goals of the Chapter this coming year is more outreach and communications with Chapter members. The purpose is to provide all members, regardless of their interest, communications with the Chapter even if they are not active. We want to let them know, they are



still fellow compatriots and welcome at any time to meetings and activities. We also request their ideas to improve the Chapter and let us know about activities that benefits the community and the Chapter.

After an initial round of editing the draft ByLaws and Constitution will be sent to all members for feedback and approval.
- <u>Chapter Branding</u>. The Governor Isaac Shelby Chapter has worked hard the last few years to participate in activities, grow in size and create our own identify to honor Governor Isaac Shelby and all Patriots from the past. Due to this we are now branding documentation using the Governor Isaac Shelby image along with the SAR emblem.
- Looking for Ideas and Interests. Many members assume the focus of the Chapter is just on grave markings and ceremonies where you dress up in Colonial attire. While this has been a major activity of the Chapter, we would also like to expand the interest to other areas for those who are not interested or in a position to go to grave markings and other ceremonies. This includes more genealogy work, historical presentations, visits to museums and other organizations presentations. If you have an area you are interested in that you feel would benefit the members of the Chapter please let Mike King know.
- <u>Ceremonies and Events</u>. Unfortunately a large number of ceremonies and events have been canceled this year due to social isolation needs. However, with optimism we are now starting to plan and schedule activities for the coming year. This includes grave markings, vigils, parades, social outings and event presentations. - <u>Chapter Projects</u>. There are some Chapter project that did not move forward this past year due to social distancing issues. These include the Dog Tag Project, Monument at Locust Grove and Lafayette Trail Markers. Hopefully these can move forward this coming year. - <u>Flu Shots</u>. Tis the season. Medical organizations have recommended getting flu shots as soon as possible. There is an expected increase in flu combined with the risk of Coronavirus. Currently there is a small house in the West End of Louisville that is being renovated by a non-profit organization to use as a home for older Veterans with no permanent place to live. The house will hold three Veterans and one support person who will watch over them. The house is still being renovated with the plan on completing the effort by the end of the year at which time the house will be furnished and prepared for the Veterans. At this time they are looking for good used furniture and household goods that can be used for the house. This includes single beds, tables, chairs, lamps, dishes, etc. A detailed list is now being prepared. So, if you have any good items you would like to donate, please contact Mike King.

## Vigil at Washington's Tomb



On September 19th the Governor Isaac Shelby Chapter was represented at Mt. Vernon, near Alexandria, Virginia for the Annual Vigil at George and Martha Washington's Tomb. The Compatriots from the Chapter included Jay Doss, Kent Hathaway and Mike King with Shelly Doss representing the DAR and Mary Jean King taking pictures. As always, it is emotional to stand guard at the tomb of our first President and military commander during the Revolutionary War. As members of the SAR, it is a privilege to remember and honor the most important founding father of our great country.



The day was sunny at the beautiful historic home overlooking the Potomac River. While the participants followed social distancing protocols, it did not diminish the impact of being at Washington's home, standing guard at his grave and touring the historic site and cultivated grounds, boat dock and farm.

The Market Fair was going on the same time as the vigil and spread out over the estate. Many in the crowd were dressed in Colonial attire making it feel as if you had stepped back in time. The crowd was smaller than usual for the vigil and fair, however it just made it more intimate and made your feel more involved. After the Vigil, the Chapter members spent the rest of the day visiting the Lincoln, Vietnam and Korean War Memorials, the DAR National Headquarters and doing a driving tour past Ford's Theatre, the US Capital and the Mall. The day was capped off with dinner in Old Town Alexan-

dria (see pictures next page). Planning has already begun for the 2021 Mt. Vernon Vigil. If interested in going this coming September look for planning announcements beginning early Summer.

<u>Cemetery Renovations Committee</u>. During this year Patrick Wesolosky, Steve Gahafer, John Buckler, Scott Giltner found an alternative to some of the usual Chapter events and activities that were canceled due to the Coronavirus. The alternative is

grave renovations. This includes finding and identifying ancestor graves and marking them with GPS locations, cleaning and cutting back vegetation, and recording them for future research and history. Also, included is cleaning up current cemeteries and tombstones that have fallen in disrepair. The work removes grit and moss from the stones so they can be read, doing adjustments and repairs on broken stones and maintenance on the site. The benefits are that the community volunteers ensure that those who passed before us are remembered, the history maintained on the stones is preserved and it gives a good outdoors activity that is recorded by the Chapter for Veterans Service. Recently the Lafayette, Gov. Isaac Shelby and Boone Chapters were involved in a training class in Frankfort for tombstone renovation and the Corn Island, DAR Chapter in Louisville held a similar class in



Eastern Cemetery. The effort to go to cemeteries that have fallen into disrepair is fast becoming an outdoor hobby that is satisfying to the person doing it and to the community and Veterans graves that are cleaned. The Chapter Cemetery Renovations Committee is assembling materials from the internet and classes to help guide those interested in doing this type of volunteer work. Hopefully during the next few months a class will be sponsored by the Chapter to train volunteers on graveyard and tombstone renovations. And, effort on some graveyards in Louisville are waiting approval to begin cleanup as soon as the leaves have fallen. If you are interested in participating you help would be appreciated. Contact Patrick Wesolosky if you are interested in helping. Veterans Service Hours. Helping on projects cleaning Veterans graves at cemeteries can earn the Chapter service hours that count towards the USS Stark award and chapter members would individually earn points towards the Service to Veterans Medal. Infor-

mation will be sent out for dates and times when cleanups occur.

## The Almost Battle of Marshfield - Kent Hathaway.

The town of Marshfield was well known as a heavy Torie town, with the lead Torie being Nathaniel Ray Thomas. The Loyalists of Marshfield wrote to General Gage to send some of their finest troops for protection from the Patriots, on January 23, 1775. A detachment of 100 troops known as the Queens Guard led by Captain Nesbitt Balfour marched their way unnoticed to stay at the Thomas mansion. These guards hunkered down for a long stay. On March 2, 1775 General Gage replied to the town of Marshfield, saying that "I have great Satisfaction in having contributed to the safety and protection of a People so eminent for their loyalty to their King and Affection to their country, at a time when Treason and Rebellion is making such hasty strides to overturn our most excellent constitution and spread ruin and desolation thro' the Province."

Patriots were harassed, aggravated, and bullied everyday by these Redcoats. Mercy Otis Warren wrote to Abagail Adams from Plymouth "You have doubtless heard that there is a detachment from headquarters stationed in the neighborhood of Plymouth. People here are much at a loss, what can be the design of this ridiculous movement; probably it is intention to provoke, till some rashness shall give a pretext, to the beginning of hostilities." The Patriots were ready for war! Local Colonel Anthony Thomas sent word to his brother, General John Thomas, at Boston to dispatch two regiments to Marshfield. With tensions rising, men of Plymouth County knew what they had to do. They would march to Marshfield and deal with Balfour's Redcoats.



Two Patriot regiments were sent to Marshfield to attack the Redcoats. The two regiments arrived in Marshfield led by Colonels Theophilus Cotton and John Baily. The militia observed the Regulars in battle maneuvers, and they were frightened by rumors that there were Cannons at the Nathaniel Ray Mansion. The Patriots did not march against the enemy, even though they outnumbered them. Had these two regiments proceeded to drive the Redcoats out of Marshfield then history would be a little different.

On April 19, 1775, the news of Lexington and Concord had reached the Marshfield Wigs around noon. Even if the Militia and Minutemen men of Plymouth County were to march towards Boston, they would have been too late to fight on the "Battle Road" alongside their fellow Compatriots. On the morning of April 20, 1775 Captain Willie Thomas climbed to the summit of Wards Hill and fired three shots to alert the town that war had begun. General Gage decided to immediately ship Balfour's regiment back to Boston. As Balfour and his troops evacuated Marshfield, more Patriots arrived from surrounding towns which included Minuteman, Samuel Savory Jr., of the Wareham Militia. These troops made and carried a coffin for the hated Nathaniel Ray Thomas who had left for Boston with the British. One of the Patriot Regiments had gotten to the mansion and asked," where are the British?" Mrs. Thomas reported "you just missed the them."

Kent Hathaway (Governor Isaac Shelby Chapter, Kentucky Society) is the 9th generation grandson of Samuel Savory, Jr., a Minuteman for the Wareham, Massachusetts Militia whose first assignment was to march to Marshfield, Massachusetts to remove the hated Regulars. References: Of Tea and Tories, Cynthia Hagar Krusell and History of Duxberry, Justin Winsor.

Gold Star Families Memorial Monument Dedication in Frankfort, Kentucky. The Governor Isaac Shelby Chapter participated in the opening ceremony for the newly dedicated Gold Star Families Memorial Monument on the Capital Grounds in Frankfort, Kentucky. The monument is the brainchild of Hershel "Woody" Williams the last surviving Medal of Honor recipient from Iwo Jima in World War II and co-founder of his organization that honors Gold Star Families and the loss of a family member while serving in he military. While the dedication was limited in number due to social isolation protocols, the addition of the SAR flag presentation provided a colorful backdrop and added to the pageantry of the ceremony. The SAR has participated in six dedication of these monument, and supports the effort to recognize and honor Gold Star Families.



The annual King's Mountain Celebration of the Overmountain Men victory over the British and Major Patrick Ferguson, in South Carolina, was held on the anniversary, October 7th. However, this year instead of doing the annual assembly and climb up the mountain to the memorial monuments, the members dialed in to a virtual ceremony. Ideas from Chapter Members. The following are some ideas from members that are helpful for wearing period clothing.

• Colonial Shoes. Many of the Chapter members who participate in events and ceremonies dress in Revolutionary War and Colonial style outfits from the tip of the hat to the bottom on the shoes. However, many complain about the shoes. Some have bought authentic style shoes only to discover they are uncomfortable, hard to walk in and expensive. Others wear gators to hide regular street shoes but would prefer to wear stockings. One idea to address these issues was pursued by Steve Gahafer recently. With a little work, you can have comfortable shoes that look like those worn in Revolutionary War times. The trick is to buy some black slip on shoes at "Off Broadway Shoes" or other shoe stores, get some shoe buckles from Townsend or another period dress vendor, some plastic tie wraps to secure the buckles and small straps of black leather that can be glued across the buckle. The effort gives you colonial shoes that look fairly authentic, are comfortable and inexpensive. Ask Steve Gahafer or Mike King if interested in making your own colonial shoes.



• Sagging Socks. One problem with wearing colonial stockings is that after they have been



worn awhile they begin to sag that can give you a that "Aunt Bee" wrinkled ankle look even if you wear garters. One suggestion is to use "blousing garters" like what is worn in the military to blouse pants over boots. The blousing garters can be worn hidden above or below the knees, easily adjusted as needed and put on and taken off in a moments notice with the little hooks. They an also be used to wrap other items that need quick access. Blousing garters are inexpensive at about \$1.00 a pair, come in a variety of colors and can be purchased thru Amazon and a variety of stores on-line. Historically Accurate Shooting Bag. Leather, oil tanned leather, pillow ticking. They were called possibles bags because in them you carried everything you could possibly need to maintain and load a flint-lock rifle or musket. They are also known as hunting bags or shooting bags. This one is based on a historic bag from the period of the American Revolution. It is made out of oil tanned leather and is lined with pillow ticking. The pillow ticking has been ever so slightly dyed with dye made from black walnut hulls to give it that aged look. The flap can be secured with a wooden button. The bag measures 9" wide and 8" high and opens up 2 1/2" front to back. The strap is 1 1/4" wide and is adjustable from 57"
