Chapter SAR Rosette Pinning Ceremonies - February 13th and 21st. After quite a few months the Chapter is finally pinning new members with the SAR Rosette signifying their official welcome into the SAR. It has been awhile and many being pinned have already been active with Chapter participation. The ceremony will still observe social isolation protocol with arrangements to do a public pinning individually with all of the appropriate pomp, circumstances and appreciation for new members.

The ceremonies are now being scheduled and will be located at Mission BBQ, 4607 Shelbyville Road, Louisville, Kentucky 40207 in the front dinning room. The days will be:

- Saturday February 13th, starting at 11:30 pm.
- Sunday February 21st, starting at 1:00 pm.

Each new member is being contacted to set up a time for their pinning. The ceremonies will be photographed and recorded for those who cannot make it. Families are welcome to come and also enjoy eating at the inexpensive family friendly Mission Bar-B-Que that supports the military and the SAR. Social distancing protocols will still be observed.

New members from other SAR Chapters and other members of the SAR who received a pin in the past but did not have a ceremony are also welcome to get pinned during this event. They are also welcome to come and receive their recognition as well as their Patriot ancestor. All members of the SAR are welcome to attend as well as their families. Also, in addition to the rosette pinning ceremony for new members. There are two new ceremonies planning for March. They include a posthumous recognition ceremony for members being listed as members in the SAR and a ceremony for the recognition of compatriots with supplemental ancestors from the Revolutionary War. Chapter Award Program and Presentation and Washington Birthday Celebration - February 20th, 6:00 pm.

The annual awards program and presentation is usually done at the Pearl Harbor Ceremony and Dinner event in December. However, the ceremony was canceled due to coronavirus isolation. SAR Museum Artifacts. During January, Zachary Distel, Museum Curator, gave some of the Governor Isaac Shelby Chapter members a tour of some of the new artifacts that have been acquired for the SAR Museum currently being constructed. The new acquisitions included Revolutionary War sword, small cannons and busts of historic Patriots, pistols and other items from the Colonial period that show how people lived and functioned at that time. Special Induction and Pinning.

<u>Rosette Pinning of Compatriot Kenneth Woodburn</u>. On January 8th at Mission BBQ, Lt. Col Kenneth Woodburn, US Army retired and Veteran of the United States Military was inducted and pinned as a fellow Compatriot under his patriot descendant Thomas Woodburn. In addition, he received the SAR War Service Certificate and Medal for his action in Operation Desert Storm



and Operation Desert Shield. The ceremony followed social isolation protocol but was still well attended with the full ceremony which includes the reading of the proclamation, the clasping of the SAR flag, taking the SAR oath and rosette pinning. President Mike King read the proclamation, Registrar Larry Selby assisted with the flag, Compatriot Brendan Potter did the pinning and Charlie Scott provided the certificate and medal to Ken's wife Tammy to present to her husband. The Patriot ceremonial induction was touching and a reminder about the sacrifices that our Patriot ancestors made as well as our current military and Veterans who protect our freedom.

Lt. Col. Woodburn has been courageously fighting prostate cancer so the induction was a spirit boosting event that showed he has support from all the members of the SAR and Chapter. We appreciate his military service, his ongoing efforts to fight the cancer, and providing public awareness about prostate cancer and treatments. We all wish Ken and Tammy Woodburn and all their family the best for the future and welcome him to the Chapter as a fellow compatriot. <u>Veterans</u> Support - Larry Selby. The Governor Isaac Shelby, Service to Veterans Chairman, Larry Selby has been busy with activities to support our Veterans.



- <u>Angel Tree Tags, VA Thanksgiving Donations and VA Christmas Adoption for Veterans</u>. The Governor Isaac Shelby Chapter members donated \$350.00 dollars in gift cards to the RRVA Medical Center. The Chapter donated \$150.00 from the GIS Veteran Funds account to purchase items for One Adopted Veteran.
- <u>Pearl Harbor Day Memorial Virtual Ceremony</u>. A virtual ceremony was held on December 10th by the Chapter to honor those who served and died at Pearl Harbor and marking the entrance of the United States into World War II.

- <u>Chaplain McClain Health Update</u>. After a hard fought battle against the Coronavirus Eric was released from rehabilitation and is now at home. He is working with a home health medical organization doing rehabilitation and said there is still a lot of work to fully recover. We miss and wish a speedy recovery to his return to his Chaplain duties for the Chapter.
- Patriots Award for Chaplains The Emerson-Rosbrugh Chaplain Patriot Award. The first Emerson-Rosbrugh Award will be given out during the Spring to CW0-4, Hershel "Woody" Williams, US Marine Corps (retired) and Medal of Honor Recipient from Iwo Jima in World War II. Mr. Williams founded the Woody Williams Foundation installing over 75 Gold Star Families Monuments nationally with 76 now in progress. Governor Isaac Shelby has had the honor to be at the groundbreakings and dedications for five of them. Mr. Williams became a lay minister for his church and served as Chaplain Emeritus for the Congressional Medal of Honor Society. As a real American hero, a member of the SAR and a Chaplain providing solace to families who lost a loved one in the military, the Chapter is honored to present the first Emerson-Robrugh Chaplains Patriot Award to Hershel "Woody" Williams.
- <u>Remembering the Four Chaplains</u>. On February 3rd, 1943 during World War II, the USAT Dorchester was struck by a torpedo. On board were 902 Officers, servicemen, and civilian workers. Among them were four chaplains: Lt. George L. Fox, Methodist; Lt. Alexander D. Goode, Jewish; Lt. John P. Washington, Catholic; and Lt. Clark V. Poling Reformed. In a totally selfless act they worked to help save as many men as possible, calm the panic and fear with spiritual guidance and gave up their own life preservers so other could live. The four Chaplains remained on the ship's slanted aft deck, standing together, arms linked, heads bowed in prayer, as the Dorchester slipped beneath the waves. The Governor Isaac Shelby Chapter remembers these brave Patriots with the highest respect and honor. Their sacrifice is not forgotten.

Planning Activities.

 Looking for More Member Outreach. One of the goals of the Chapter this coming year is more outreach and communications with Chapter members. - <u>Missing Chapter Members</u>. - <u>Upcoming Chapter Directory</u>. The social isolation due to the Coronavirus has shown the Chapter that there is an increased need for a detailed Chapter Directory. There have been some problems with communications with all members of the Chapter, updated email addresses and ensuring that everyone is kept up to date with Chapter activities. Due to this a detailed Chapter Directory is being developed that will be available to all members of the Chapter and other Chapters as requested. The Directory will hopefully be out by Spring 2021.
- <u>Chapter Brotherhood</u>. During the past year other nearby SAR Chapters have been involved with the Governor Isaac Shelby Chapter. So, part of the outreach to other SAR and DAR members is to have them post announcements for their activities and events in the Governor Isaac Shelby newsletter. The mutual support will be beneficial for all concerned.
- <u>Associates and Friends Program</u>. The Associates Program is a Chapter activity that is for those working on their lineage to become an SAR member. It is also for those who would like to participate with the Chapter activities but cannot become a member. The exact criteria and standards for the Chapter are still in discussion.
- <u>Alliances with Other Organizations</u>. When we participate in ceremonies and events, there are guests and other organizations interested in our outfits and what we do. Many have expressed interest in cross participation with their events. Due to this, the Chapter email list includes other organizations. The Alliances program is design to solicit support and communications with other organizations in our area. Many have events we are interested in, and in turn, they have activities that we may be interested in. This expanded communications will help our Chapter gain more supporting partners and observers for our events. The exact criteria and standards for this program is still in discussion. - <u>ByLaws and Constitution Updates</u>. The Chapter ByLaws and Constitution are undergoing an annual review for changes and additions to ensure that they support the members of the Chapter appropriately. Currently there are a variety of committee additions that will expand activities and opportunities for the Chapter members. After an initial round of editing the draft ByLaws and Constitution will be sent to all members for feedback and approval.

On January 8th, 2021 members of the Governor Isaac Shelby Chapter presented Dr. Noble Lafayette Roberts the annual Chapter award in memory of past Chapter President and SAR activist, Reverend Forrest Chilton. The award was presented by Compatriots



Charlie Scott, Chuck Scott and Mike King with honor and respect. Dr. Roberts earned his PhD from the University of Louisville after serving his country during World War II with distinction and courage fighting in the Pacific Campaign. During WWII Noble was a signalman in the U.S. Coast Guard serving on an LST. He saw action in the Pacific Theater and was near Iwo Jima at the time of the flag raising. He now lives in Shelbyville. He is a legacy of the Governor Isaac Shelby Chapter and was active from the beginning. We thank him for all of his contributions throughout his life to America, his community and our Patriot ancestors.

Patriot and Community Cemetery Committee. During the last year Patrick Wesolosky, Steve Gahafer, John Buckler, Scott Giltner, Mike King and others have found an alternative for Chapter events and activities canceled due to the Coronavirus. The alternative is cemetery cleanups and renovations. This includes finding and identifying ancestor graves and marking them with GPS locations, cleaning and cutting back vegetation, and recording them for future research and history. Also, included is cleaning current cemeteries and tombstones that have fallen in disrepair. Many of the stones are dissolving due to time, covered with dirt and algae and are becoming hard to read. The work removes grit and moss from, resets stones, repairing broken stones and do-ing maintenance. The benefits include having those who passed before us are remembered, their history maintained and the stones are preserved. It also provides a good outdoors activity that is recorded by the Chapter for Veterans Service.

Due to the interest in cemetery renovation and preservation, a committee called the *Patriot and Community Cemetery Committee* has been formed in the Chapter with guidelines for cemetery renovation and maintenance. The committee can provide direction to assist with the location and documentation of graves, the cleanup and cemetery restoration. There are now plans for additional training and projects in the Spring. If any reader knows of a Revolutionary War Patriot in a graveyard that may not be documented or a cemetery in disrepair please send that information to the newsletter so assistance can be provided to collect the needed information for posterity. The following are new cemetery projects now getting started. If interested contact Mike King.

- <u>Brown-Lawrence Cemetery</u>. The historical cemetery needs a cleanup and removal of bushes, tree branches and raking. The project is approved by St. Matthews and will begin in February. An email will be sent out with time and work to be done.
- <u>Greenwood Cemetery</u>. Greenwood historical cemetery, at 40th and Hale Avenue in the West End of Louisville has fallen into severe disrepair. Extensive work is being done to bring the cemetery back to community standards includong cutting grass, trees and shrubs and leveling tombstones. The project is under the NABVETS and Rotary who would like help by the Governor Isaac Shelby Chapter. The cemetery was originally owned by the same organization as Eastern and Schardein Cemeteries.

<u>Scott, Andrew and Elizabeth Gilter Grave Identification</u>. During January Scott, Andrew and Elizabeth Giltner continued their work doing research to find and document patriots graves in Kentucky. They go to locations where there may be graves of

patriots buried and record the information and GPS coordinates of that gravesite so it can be found again in the future. On their last trip the located 9 Patriot graves, took photographs and got GPS coordinates. The ongoing efforts of the Giltner family have located many patriot gravestones that are now documented in the SAR database.

Colonial tombstones in Kentucky were usually made of sandstone, slate or local granite. Most were sandstone which is why many have disappeared.

Kentucky Lafayette Chapter Patriot's Grave Research.

Kentucky's Lafayette Chapter's last in person meeting was held early in March 2020, just as the Covid crisis was beginning in earnest. During this meeting, Compatriot Wesolosky detailed, in a short presentation to the chapter how he had seen a Patriot's grave that sorely needed attention. He showed before and after pictures; the "before" picture showed what was once a clean, well -tended site, with a small upright V.A. headstone, the entire small enclosure surrounded by a yard-tall black iron fence.

The "after" picture showed some overgrown weeds with the headstone and even the fence completely hidden from view. Compelled by the striking lack of obvious care from the photos, soon after, Compatriots from the Lafayette Chapter began locating sites, obtaining permission from landowners, and cleaning gravesites and headstones, if any can be located in large and small cemeteries and graveyards in central Kentucky.

During this search for Patriot's graves we encountered two landowners who still live on land once owned by their Patriot ancestors. We visited the first of these two properties on June 30, 2020. Met by descendant Andy Wilson, we were led to the gravesite of his ancestor, Alijah Woods. According to the family headstone, Alijah was born in 1740 in Morristown, New Jersey and served in the militia under Captain William Hogan. This militia was responsible for defending Bryan Station in what was Fayette County, Virginia (now Fayette County, Kentucky,) between the years 1780 and 1782. (continued). Andy's Wilson's family own this and other properties of historical significance in Jessamine County, Kentucky. They are well respected throughout their town and in the central Kentucky Farming community. One of their properties is near Woods Road, (Alijah Woods) which is adjacent to the Wilson farms, so in addition to having led us to Alijah Wood's gravesite , Andy met us in early August and escorted us to the grave of another Patriot of which he was aware. This was the grave of Patriot George Cleveland,1757-1850. We are researching more information about Patriot Cleveland, but we were glad to be able to have had the opportunity to honor another Patriot.

After quite some detective work and many telephone conversations, a volunteer from the Madison county Historical Society was able to speak with Mrs. Betsy Burch, wife of a former LaFayette Chapter President. Mrs. Burch put is in contact with Mr. William (or as Mrs. Burch called her cousin, "Billy Glenn") Turpin. Mr. Turpin and his son Scott own and operate several farms in Madison County, Kentucky.

Mr. Turpin is a retired public school-agriculture teacher. On July 18, 2020 we met Mr. Turpin and his son and were granted access to the farm where their ancestor, Conrad Cornelison is buried along with other family members. Tucked away in a corner of their property, with a subdivision and an industrial area looming, this is one of the cemeteries in the Richmond area containing graves with the Cornelison name.

Conrad Cornelison was born on May 28, 1763 in Loudoun, Virginia and moved to Rowan, North Carolina as a child. (sarpatriots.sar.org biography) In September 1779, at the age of 16, Conrad

Cornelison joined the fight for America's independence as a private in Colonel Hampton's North Carolina Regiment. Discharged in March, 1781, Conrad served again under Peter Hendrick until the close of the war. By 1792 Conrad had moved his family to Kentucky where the Cornelison family name is still prominent.

On that day we were privileged to visit the resting place of, as our SAR pledge says, a "hero" of the American Revolution., where we preliminarily cleaned the headstone and monument, and promised to return when the weather was cooler in order to do a more thorough cleaning of the cemetery, less encumbered by the overgrowth of weeds, etc. We were honored to speak with

Mrs. Burch, and to meet Andy Wilson and Mr. Turpin and his son Scott, to pay our respects to those Patriots who still have family living on land they owned and upon which they are buried. Lafayette and Governor Issac Shelby Chapter members have been involved in searching to find those graves and document their locations. We have been able to do so even during this pandemic, staying healthy and observing social distancing and wearing masks where appropriate. We have located and documented over one hundred Patriot graves in central Kentucky- and the search continues.





2020 Wreaths Across America, Zachary Taylor National Cemetery. Social isolation protocols made it a challenge for the annual *Wreaths Across America* ceremony at Zachary Taylor National Ceremony. However, with perseverance and planning by Scott Giltner the placement of wreaths on the graves of Veterans was still accomplished. The National Cemetery Administration, managing all Federal Veterans cemeteries, required only 10 people can be in the cemetery as a group. So, the memorial ceremony was limited to ten people and held on Friday, December 18th. The actual placement of wreaths on the graves was December 19th and required scheduling of 10 people at a time to place wreaths and then leave for others to then place theirs. Again, when the wreaths were removed at the end of the Holiday Season, only ten volunteers could be there to remove the wreaths. Overall, in spite of any obstacles, the Governor Isaac Shelby Chapter was still able to honor and remember those who served and sacrificed for our country in the military.

- <u>SAR and Chapter Awards Committee</u> <u>Chairpersons Charlie Scott and Patrick Wesolosky</u>. This committee tracks members participation in events leading to certificates, medals and awards. This committee helped to create new Chapter awards for Color Guardsmen, Women Veterans and Military Chaplains under Chapter Champlain Eric McClain.
- Special Chapter Projects. Some projects now underway follow. If interested in helping contact Mike King.
 - <u>Memorial Stone Marker at Locust Grove</u>. A proposal last year was made to do an SAR marker stone at Locust Grove near the DAR marker near their front entrance. This project will be organized during the next few months.
 - Dog Tag Project. The goal of the project is to have a hanging dog tag for each of the Governor Isaac Shelby Chapter members, past and present. Each tag will have the members and their ancestors name on it. While the dog tags are not Revolutionary War period, they are inexpensive and can create a unique exhibit for SAR members. The planning includes finding a location for the exhibit, determining costs, updating, structure, associated ceremonies, etc. It could be open to others and used for public relations efforts.
 - <u>Lafayette Trail</u>. The Lafayette Trail Association is marking the route of the General Marquis de Lafayette during is historic
 1824 tour through the United States. Part of that tour was through Kentucky including Middletown, the home of the Governor Isaac Shelby Chapter. More information on the markers and overall effort in the next newsletter.
 - <u>Gold Star Family Projects</u>. The Governor Isaac Shelby Chapter has participated in over seven Woody Williams Foundation,
 Gold Star Families Memorial Monuments ceremonies over the last four years. More are coming with plans to build more monuments in the Louisville and Shelbyville area.
 - WaterStep Shoe Project. The WaterStep organization in Louisville is now collecting usable used shoes for third world countries. To help with this the Governor Isaac Shelby Chapter will ask for any shoe donations starting in February. If you have any new or old shoes, boots, etc. that are usable we will be putting out a call and start collecting them in February and March. Shoes are donated to WaterStep who send the to third world countries and converts them to funding to provide clean water to third world countries and natural disasters. www.WaterStep.org | Save lives with safe water.
 - Veterans Home Support. Currently there is a small house in the West End of Louisville that is being renovated by a non-profit organization to use as a home for older Veterans with no permanent place to live. The house will hold three Veterans and one support person who will watch over them and will be ready by Spring 2021. At that time they will be looking for good used furniture and household goods that can be used for the house. This includes single beds, tables, chairs, lamps, dishes, etc. A detailed list is now being prepared. So, if you have any good items to donate, please contact Mike King.
 - <u>Chapter Bell Project</u>. The use of the Chapter bell will be added to some ceremonies and events. Unfortunately the current bell is heavy and difficult to carry and manage. Due to this a new bell is being sought that is more lightweight and easier to manage while still providing a nice resonating tone. The selection and cost effort is now underway.

• Looking for Ideas and Interests. Many members assume the focus of the Chapter is just on grave markings and ceremonies where you dress up in Colonial attire. While this has been a major activity of the Chapter, we would also like to expand the interest to other areas for those who are not interested or in a position to go to grave markings and other ceremonies. This includes more genealogy work, historical presentations, visits to museums and other organizations presentations. 
